Synopsis

ACT I

PROLOGUE

Captain Vere ("Starry" Vere), an old man, recalls the troubled summer of 1797, during the French wars, when, shortly after the mutiny at the Nore, he commanded the 'Indomitable.'

Scene 1-The Main-deck and Quarter-deck of the 'Indomitable.'

The ship is making for the coast of France. A boarding-party returns with three men it has impressed from a homeward-bound merchantman. Among them is Billy Budd, a splendid recruit with only one defect — a stammer that takes him at moments of stress. He enlists gladly, but his exuberant farewell to his old ship 'The Rights of Man' raises doubts as to his loyalty. Claggart, the Master-at-arms, orders Squeak to spy on him. A young Novice, crippled by flogging, is helped along the deck by his friends. Officers and men are summoned for a Captain's Muster. Vere rouses them to fierce enthusiasm for the battles ahead.

INTERVAL

Warning bells will be sounded five minutes and two minutes before the rise of the curtain.

ACT II

Scene I-THE CAPTAIN'S CABIN. A WEEK LATER.

The senior officers accept Vere's invitation to drink with him. All are eager to get at the French. Their conversation is interspersed by the distant sound of men singing below decks. News is brought that Cape Finisterre has been sighted. The officers hurry off, leaving Vere alone.

SCENE 2-THE BERTH-DECK. THE SAME EVENING.

The seamen off duty are singing shanties. Billy discovers Squeak ferreting in his kitbag and attacks him. Claggart stops the fight and orders the men to turn in. Alone on the silent deck, Claggart expresses his hatred for Billy's simple goodness and determines to destroy him. The Novice, whose spirit has been broken by hardship, comes in. Claggart instructs him to tempt Billy to mutiny. Roused from sleep, Billy does not at first grasp the Novice's purpose: when he does, he is furious and his stammer seizes him. An old seaman, Dansker, comes to find out what has happened. He solemnly warns Billy to beware of Claggart's deadly enmity, but Billy does not heed him.

INTERVAL

Warning bells will be sounded five minutes and two minutes before the rise of the curtain.

ACT III

SCENE I-THE MAIN-DECK AND QUARTER-DECK. SOME DAYS LATER.

Claggart seeks an interview with Captain Vere, but he is interrupted by a wild cry from the main-top. The mist, which has been hampering the search for enemy vessels, has lifted suddenly and a French frigate is revealed. They alter course to chase her, the drums beat to quarters, the crew hurries to battle-stations. Cannon are loaded, all sail is set and they wait eagerly for the wind to bring them within range. But the wind dies, the mist closes in once more, the chase is abandoned as hopeless. Claggart again approaches Vere, to unfold a carefully-planned accusation against Billy of conspiring to mutiny. Vere disbelieves him and sends for Billy.

Scene 2-The Captain's Cabin.

Billy arrives cheerfully: he has heard rumours of promotion. His frank manner confirms Vere's belief in his innocence. Vere calls Claggart in and orders him repeat his accusation. He does so. Speechless with horror, Billy is seized with his stammer. He lets fly with his fist and kills Claggart. Vere is torn between the conviction that he has seen goodness strike down evil, and the knowledge that there can only be one punishment for Billy's crime. A drumhead court-martial is summoned. It finds the prisoner guilty: he is sentenced to be hanged at dawn. Vere accepts the verdict and goes to inform Billy of his fate.

INTERVAL

Warning bells will be sounded five minutes and two minutes before the rise of the curtain.

ACT IV

Scene 1-A BAY OF THE UPPER GUN-DECK. BEFORE DAWN.

Billy lies pinioned between two cannon. Dansker creeps in, unobserved by the marine sentry, to say goodbye. Alone, Billy takes farewell of 'this grand rough world' and finds new strength in the vision of 'a sail . . . the far-shining sail that's not fate.'

Scene 2-The Main-deck and Quarter-deck. Dawn.

The entire ship's company assembles to witness execution. Billy's last words are "Starry Vere — God bless you!" A mutiny threatens at his death, but it is checked by orders of 'Down all hands!' Slowly, from force of habit the men obey

EPILOGUE

Vere is tormented by the memory of his own failure to preserve innocence from destruction. He could have saved the victim, but earthly laws silenced him. He finds peace in recollecting the pardon Billy gave him, and he too catches sight of the 'far-shining sail.'
